From The Editor Percy Webb Competition is on April 30th!

First, an urgent correction, if you get hold of this copy of Mardles early enough: the competition for the Percy Webb Memorial Trophy this year is on April 30th this year, not as published in last issue's advert.

My apologies for this oversight: the date was included in a footnote to the review of last year's competition from Mary Dickinson, and is an exception to the general "first Sunday in May" rule.

Your Post-Suffolk Folk Survival Guide

It seems increasingly likely that Suffolk Folk and in particular Mardles will not continue in their present form next year, and I have been looking at what else is available in the area for folk music enthusiasts.

When Mardles was in trouble several years ago The East Anglian Traditional Music Trust expressed an interest in taking it over, however the upheaval following Katie Howson's imminent departure (more about that elsewhere) means that's unlikely to be an option now.

There has been some discussion recently about creating a live folk listings web site that could be updated by anyone with events to list. There would be many advantages to having something like the Mardles listings information on line. If nobody steps forward to take over the web site and the production of Mardles, at least I could put the club and sessions listings on the web site and allow it to be edited on line, something we've avoided in the past because we thought it would impact the sales of the magazine.

Folk East looks like it's here to stay as a festival, and has started to sprout offshoots such as events during the rest of the year.

There were always promotional concerts in the run up to the festival, but this year saw a new winter mini-festival at the Snape Maltings. Unfortunately that coincided with Suffolk Folk's Riverside Day of Folk, but some committee members, including myself, paid a visit on the Saturday evening and couldn't help noticing that the average age of those present was considerably lower than at the Riverside Day. Despite a comment that the event was advertised nationally so the younger ones could have come from anywhere, we recognised several local faces.

Folk East also now has a paper publication produced at erratic intervals: The Eastfolk Chronicle. Don't expect 100% factual information (yes, we had fake news before Trump), but it's a highly entertaining read and free wherever you can find a copy. See eastfolkchronicle.co.uk for more, including downloadable copies of the newspaper (it's in tabloid format).

The Suffolk Folk Playford Ball is now run by a consortium of local dance clubs and there's no reason why that shouldn't continue, especially as it has been very successful recently.

Meanwhile some smaller local organisations have become more ambitious, such as Bury Folk Collective, which started by running a series of regular evenings of different styles (singarounds, traditional, unplugged, "wired folk") and is now putting on what promises to be an annual folk festival in Bury St Edmunds.

In a completely different vein, Acoustic East (acoustic-east.org.uk) is a web site listing many folk performers in the area and worth consulting if you are thinking of putting on a concert or ceilidh and looking for someone to fill the bill.

Perhaps we should have a list of local folk organizations that do more than just "run a club", and a loosely linked network that enables them to keep track of each other and collaborate. A sort of online "Folk Directory". I'm simply throwing out a few ideas in case it gets you thinking about a different approach to keeping people in the folk community in touch with each other.

The Folk Family

It is a community, too, as I was pleasantly reminded recently. As some of you already know, Mary Humphreys and I are moving to Yorkshire and we've already bought a house there. In early March we were up there for a few days, and in a supermarket in Keighley we bumped into Jenny Scott, who has run the Bacca Pipes Folk Club in that town for over forty years. We've played there a couple of times so we recognised each other, and in the ensuing conversation Jenny's most memorable words were "welcome to the family!"

A Suffolk Folk Promoted Concert

Morris On! Dave Evans and Gill Brett

Morris On!

You may be pleased to learn that all we are going to say about "blacking-up" in this edition is that the Whittlesea Straw Bear festival passed off without incident.

In the last edition we had a diagram showing the genealogy of Lagabag and related sides. This aroused some comment; in my defence, I had suggested it was a speculative description and without labelling it as "fake news" I acknowledged that there may be "alternative facts". Perhaps I should have also said that there were "known unknowns" and it was a couple of these that came to the surface.

Jill Parson pointed out missing links in the genealogy; Sue and Richard Davis danced with Barley Brigg for a season before moving on to form Lagabag and there should have been an arrow linking Gyppeswick Garland to Hoxon Hundred. Barley Brigg also had connections with dancers who were involved in the beginnings of Haughley Hoofers, Old Glory, Point Devis, Oxblood Molly and Reel Dance Ceilidhs.

Talking of ceilidhs: Ray Smith of Jasper Ceilidh Band got in touch to correct the record regarding Mandrake Morris which was not, as we reported, formed from Flying Tatters. In fact Ray claims to be, if not the founder, at least the grit in the oyster that formed them. In the late 70s early 80s his then wife and her friend, Liz Bruce, saw a ladies' Morris side, and wanted to try dancing the Morris so despite the 90 miles round trip from Walton on the Naze to the nearest side at Chelmsford they gave it a go. Rapidly the journey got too much and as Ray put it "in a moment of madness, I suggested they started their own side, and as a concertina player volunteered to be their musician". Mandrake Morris had a varied repertoire including dances (not border as we reported), and later included clog step dancing and Appalachian step dancing. I've no idea whether or not there was a link with Flying Tatters; perhaps someone else can clear that up?

This edition coincides with the 40th Anniversary of Haughley Festival Morris, a side you may never have heard of although you will know well its Morris offspring; Hageneth and Bury Fair. In honour of this significant anniversary we have included a rather large section describing the birth pangs of the two sides and the other sides which emerged from the loins of these dancers (literally in some cases!).

Mandrake Morris had a varied repertoire including North West Clog garland, bobbin and stick Although we were there just after the new side was born we are grateful to the history of the "First Six Years" recorded in November 1983 by the late Ronnie Godbold. We have had to edit this for reasons of space

but have retained as much as possible of Ronnie's content and style. Gill has also added some additional information from the Bury Fair point of view (Gill, to her surprise, was reminded that she was the first Bury Fair "Bagman").

Should Morris be considered part of the UK's "Intangible Cultural Heritage"? Gill raises the question and asks you to consider joining a campaign.

Thanks to all the sides which have sent in their summer dancing dates; Gill has assembled these into a comprehensive list.

Haughley Festival Morris The first six years 1977- 83

Prologue

In the mid 1970s George Monger, exmember of Blackmore Morris Men, from the Brentwood area, moved to work and live at the Museum of East Anglian Rural Life at Stowmarket, Suffolk. He had tried to generate interest in all things folk around the town throughout 1976, and founded the Stowmarket Folk Club and attempted to form a morris side by holding practice sessions. These efforts came to nothing due to a lack of numerical support but he had whetted the appetites of several men who would be only too willing to continue their interest should a future opportunity present itself.

The Formation

In 1977 the organising committee of the Haughley Village Mediaeval Fayre contacted George and asked if he could organise and train a side just for the one event. He agreed, and with only eight weeks in which to practise Haughley Festival Morris began. The side first danced in kit, and to the public, at the Chestnut Horse, Great Finborough, on 22nd June. The first official engagement was at the Mediaeval Fayre on 26th June 1977.

The original side comprised 7 novices (all men except Sally Green, now dancing with Hoxne & Bury Fair) and 4 experienced dancers (ex. St. Edmundsbury, East Suffolk, Winchester and Blackmore). Des Herring gave support by appearing with East 'Billy'. Suffolk's Horse The dances performed, in two thirty minute shows, included examples from the Bampton, Adderbury, Fieldtown, Brackley Headington traditions. The event was a tremendous success, so much so that the side agreed to continue together instead of breaking up as originally planned.

June - November 1977: once it was decided

to continue a more permanent name was needed and Paddy Butcher suggested HAGENETH, the old name for the former castle at Haughley where practices were held, and the stylised village sign became the logo.

The side's colours were suggested by Ron Godbold who recommended maroon, gold, and black; the main colours of the old Mid Suffolk Grammar School and Stowmarket Town Football Club. They also happened to be the ex-St Edmundsbury colours, so some form of West Suffolk continuity would be ensured. Dave Burt was appointed temporary Squire and Brian Francis became Bagman.

First full season 1977–1978; at the first practice of the new season, to the great surprise of most of the men, a large number of women turned up and initially sat down to watch but the foreman and Squire Dave Burt invited them to join the dancing saying, "I'm not having anyone just watching". At the first AGM held on 1st November 1977 it was agreed that it "was acceptable" for the

women to attend practices but that there would be no mixed dancing in public. The side performed as Hageneth Morris for a couple of years with the men's and women's sides performing alternately when dancing out on Wednesday nights or at fêtes.

In this first season Hageneth held an instructional by Roy Dommett and Tubby Reynolds (Stanton Harcourt and Ducklington) and appeared in 2 stage shows in Ipswich with the Trunkles Ceilidh Band, one of which was recorded by Radio Orwell and was later released as part of the 'Trunkles Traditional' LP (Sweet Folk & Country SFA 088). In June the side appeared at the Norwich Folk Festival.

The side also had a very strong social side including mountain climbing arranged by side member Bruce Sydell and a surfing/water ski-ing and camping weekend at Bawdsey on the Suffolk coast.

Second season 1978-1979: naiveté and youthful enthusiasm led to the organising an exchange with a foreign dance troupe La Compagnie Marc Leclerc from Angers, France. Hageneth Morris and some members of East Suffolk hosted the event during the week of Stowmarket's carnival and the French visitors were asked to head the procession. The following week the hosts travelled to Angers for sightseeing, fraternisation, and dancing, notably at the 'Assemblée des Coiffes', at which the English sides received top billing.

Brian Francis organised Adderbury and Bledington instructionals, both sides produced new kit and the May Day Tour became a traditional first dancing-out event of the season.

Third season 1979-1980: two major changes occurred over the winter recess. Firstly, it was time for a change of officers and secondly, the women adopted the name Bury Fair in reference to the historic fair in the town which

was banned by Act of Parliament in 1871. This demonstrated the degree of independence that the ladies were acquiring. The men became Hageneth Morris Men. However, both parts of the side continued to dance out on Wednesdays as a double bill.

The side also held their first official 'ale' on the 16th February 1980. Invitations were turned down by several all-male sides but it did not prevent the event being a success for all who attended.

The fourth year 1980-1981: this was the final year that Hageneth men's and women's sides remained directly connected. Practices continued to be separate, and a small crisis arose for Hageneth when Paddy Butcher, the main musician, stylist, and mentor, decided to concentrate on playing for the women dancers.

For the first time Bury Fair declined to join Hageneth on the traditional May Day Tour, and went to Southend instead to dance with Turn of the Tide. The main event of the season was a combined Day of Dance around the Suffolk coast arranged by Bury Fair and attended by Windsor ladies and Downes Morris.

The fifth year 1981-1982: at the AGM at the White Horse, Haughley New Street, the final break was made and Hageneth announced that they wished to separate completely from

Bury Fair. This required arranging dancingout programmes so that the two stands were close enough for husband and wife pairs to get to either easily.

Although now split from Bury Fair a joint second foreign exchange was arranged to Aschau-am-Inn, near Munich in Bavaria, as guests of the Stoabacher dance group.

The sixth year 1982-1983: highlights of the sixth season included dancing out with Westerly Morris from Rhode Island, USA, and with Thaxted Morris. In August Hageneth attended their first official Ring event: the Isle of Wight Ring Meeting. As the only non-Ring side attending, they were honoured to be asked to perform a show dance at the final mass display at Sandown and chose Queen's Delight, Bucknell.

The Aschau group made a return visit in September, and were treated to the normal routine of visits, parties, and ceilidhs and were star performers at the Felsham Street Fayre.


The seventh AGM decided the side should try for election to the Morris Ring of England and in March 1983 Hageneth applied for membership at the Annual Representatives' Meeting and were duly elected as members.

Haughley Festival Morris Genealogy

Pen Pictures of the personalities and sides behind the Genealogy Chart

Haughley Festival Morris (HFM)

Founded in May 1977 this was the name chosen for the first side to begin Morris dancing in Haughley. The side had 12 members including 9 male dancers and one woman (Sally Green dancing in the same kit as the men) and 2 musicians (Paddy Butcher and Eileen Monger).

George Monger had previously danced with Blackmore M.M. who danced in the Brentwood / Chelmsford area.

Brian Francis, founder member and current elder statesman of Hageneth is the link between Bury Folk Club, St Edmundsbury M.M. and Winchester M.M. Brian moved to Bury St Edmunds from Twickenham in the early 1960s and with Paddy Butcher founded the Bury Folk Club, learned his Morris dancing with St Edmundsbury and then moved briefly to Hampshire where he linked up with Winchester M.M. Brian was a founder member of Haughley Festival Morris and is still dancing (but usually playing) with Hageneth.

Paddy Butcher was an original member of St Edmundsbury. On their demise he went to East Suffolk M.M. and then returned to become a founder member and lead musician of HFM and Hageneth.

Heather and Mike Bexon in 1983/4 were founder members of Hoxon Hundred Morris. Other founder members included Jill Parson and other members of Gyppeswyk Garland. Jill and others went on to form Barley Brigg, and with Heather was a founder member of Haughley Hoofers. She recalls that they had their first dance out in 1985 (but Hoofers celebrated their 25th Anniversary in 2008?!). By this time Mike was playing for Hageneth and, happily, continues to do so.

Bury Fair: the female members of Hageneth Morris left in 1980 to form Bury Fair. There are mixed memories of whether or not the split was "acrimonious"; however, the separation of the ways was inevitable once the men decided they wanted to join the Morris Ring. There was no such thing as Open Morris or the Morris Federation at the time and there was a stark choice between the Ring (all male) or the Women's Morris Federation, which in 1982 became the Morris Federation despite the objections of Bury Fair, who wanted to preserve the special nature of the Women's Federation (see Mardles, May – July 2015 edition).

Haughley Hoofers were formed in 1983 (or 1985!) by members of Bury Fair who wanted to learn North West clog, some of whom had been learning individual clog stepping with Heather Bexon. Heather's link with Hoxon Hundred brought in some other members from outside the Haughley/Stowmarket area.

Green Dragon were formed in 1993 and included some ex-members of Bury Fair who preferred to dance the Border style in a mixed side.

Hakluyt were also formed in 1993 for the opposite reason; they wanted nothing to do with women morris dancers or musicians and the split with Hageneth was definitely

"acrimonious". The Squire of Hageneth at the time, Richard Hall, even felt it necessary to have a "referendum" on the question of "Are you in favour of female musicians playing for the side: Yes or No?" The result was in favour of including women and 3 or 4 members of Hageneth left to form Hakluyt M.M. (named after an explorer who had a link with Wetheringsett where some of the side lived). Hakluyt didn't last very long (less than 10 years) and when they folded some members joined East Suffolk but none returned to Hageneth.

East Suffolk M.M.: Hageneth and East Suffolk have had close associations from the beginning until the present day with several members dancing for both sides and East Suffolk men have often helped Hageneth fulfill bookings at home and abroad. Relations were not always cordial and East Suffolk refused to support the Hageneth initial application for Ring membership saying in effect; "Hageneth do not fully understand the spirit of the Morris and ought to spend more time in the company of male sides". Fortunately these sentiments have long since passed and were, in many ways, a feature of their time.

Wedding Bells: On a happier note it is worth recording that, at various periods during the last 40 years, there have been 5 weddings of Hageneth and Hoofer couples and 32 other members of one side or another joined as couples.

Morris Offspring: We can also think of at least 9 children of members who have appeared for one or other of the sides as dancers or musicians. Bury Fair can also claim to have 3 generations of the Chapman family (Clodagh, Mandy and Ceridwen) dancing for them all at the same time in the early 1980s.

Is Morris an Intangible Cultural Heritage?

Three years ago on holiday in Portugal we visited a restaurant where there was a Fado singer. For those who have never heard of Fado (as I hadn't) it is a traditional kind of singing particular to Portugal and often tells stories of love, loss and tragedy. I discovered that Fado is listed by UNESCO as an Intangible Cultural Heritage (ICH). UNESCO World Heritage Sites are well known; most people have heard of at least some of the UK sites listed, for example Stonehenge or the Giant's Causeway - all very tangible. I had never heard of Intangible Cultural Heritage though and looked it up. The UNESCO website says: "cultural heritage does not end monuments and collections of objects. It also includes traditions or living expressions inherited from our ancestors and passed on to our descendants, such as oral traditions, performing arts, social practices, rituals, festive events, knowledge and practices concerning nature and the universe or the knowledge and skills to produce traditional crafts".

I wondered what was listed under this heading for the UK. Answer: absolutely nothing: nothing for any of the countries in Great Britain. This is because our governments have not ratified the 2003 UNESCO Convention for the Safeguarding of Intangible Heritage and so cannot apply to have anything listed. On 10th June 2015 Baroness Hooper asked the Government when they planned to "ratify the 2003 UNESCO Convention for the Safeguarding of Intangible Heritage". Baroness Neville-Rolfe swered on 25th June for the Government that "the government has no plans to ratify the convention at present, but we will keep the situation under review".

You may wonder what on earth this has to do with morris dancing. Over the years we have often been asked about the history of Morris; I have even been asked whether North West Clog is Scottish dancing, though not by a Scot! Generally speaking, and despite the best efforts of morris sides, there does seem to be a remarkable degree of ignorance about our traditional dances. This ignorance may be forgiven in tourists or in those whose ethnic roots are in other lands, but they are usually interested, respectful and intrigued as morris doesn't accord with the popular "stuffed shirt" image of Brits abroad. Possibly, they may also recognise an echo of their own customs. It is sad and frustrating though, when those from this country display an ignorance which may lead to the ridicule and disparagement all morris dancers have met at one time or another.

A few years ago there was a flurry of publicity when it was claimed in the press that morris dancing was dying and there was a chorus of "Oh no it isn't" from dancers all over the country. The morris organisations have recently carried out a dance census of numbers, ages of dancers, types of dance etc. The result has not yet been published, but I suspect that it will show that many, if not most, sides are ageing and find it difficult to recruit younger people, reinforcing what many of us know anecdotally to be true. Would UNESCO recognition respect for morris and hence recruitment? Unesco says "the increased visibility created by being inscribed on [their] lists may also help with recognizing and appreciating minority groups, and even boost the selfesteem and standing of communities and groups that bear and practise the intangible cultural heritage element inscribed".*

Some may worry that such a listing would mean that customs would be preserved in aspic and morris dancers stress that morris is a living tradition. Many sides make up their own dances, just as folk singers continue to compose new songs, many of them (songs and dances) commenting on recent history or current events. UNESCO though, is careful to warn against changing "heritage to suit tourists' demands" and the "danger of freezing heritage through a 'folklorisation' process or the quest for 'authenticity'".

Backing this convention would mean that an inventory of our indigenous national dances, music, crafts, customs etc. would have to be carried out - everything from the Bacup Coconut Dancers to Gloucester Cheese Rolling – a painstaking and probably expensive exercise. Then application could be made to have them Registered or included on the Urgent Safeguarding List. Like many other things this could have been done more easily in more prosperous times. It all means money and commitment of course from a cash strapped Government with, nowadays, nothing on its mind but Brexit. I fear therefore that as far as morris dancing goes, any "boost [in] the self-esteem and standing of communities and groups" is not likely to come from that direction.

If you would like to support a campaign for the UK to ratify the UNESCO Convention on Intangible Cultural Heritage, there is an online petition that is accruing signatures very slowly. A petition of 10,000 signatures warrants a response from Parliament and less than 900 more are needed to get to this number. At 100,000 signatures it would be considered for a debate. - 2. The Dancing England event in Sheffield seems to have been a sell-out and there is hope that it will again become a regular part of the Morris calendar. There seems to have been some controversy before the event that there were insufficient "traditional" sides included but the organisers pledged that; "In time, all the six Traditional Cotswold Morris teams and the six Traditional Longsword teams will feature alongside the many other markers of our diverse and unique customs. Look out for Straw Bears, Dragons, Hosses, Mollys, Borderers and the new teams who are pushing it all along so that there will still be a Tradition in centuries to come".
- 3. Judging by their appearance at Dancing England in February Seven Champions' promised "new look" seems to be a white face with a black quadrant covering the right eye and part of the forehead only (see picture).

It is good to know that the fertility reputation of Morris is still in good working order and the evidence was provided by writer and comedian Shappi Khorsandi who, in February, told the world on Radio 4 Midweek that 10 years ago, having been diagnosed as unable to have children she attended a solstice event where a Morris side "performed a fertility dance with me" and within a year she had conceived and produced a child. So, it works then!

Up A Double And Back

My thanks go to Jen Larner for the following article. Jen is one of the dancers at our Mid Suffolk Folk Dance Club but also a teacher of Circle Dance. I approached her earlier this year for an article to include in this issue of Mardles and I visited her class at Drinkstone.

Circle Dancing

I have been circle dancing for over 30 years now, but I still get the question all the time: "What is circle dancing? I've never heard of it!" So read on and all will be revealed...

Dances can be energetic and lively or gentle and reflective, complex or straightforward. Many of them have fascinating histories and stories surrounding them. Though the dances chosen reflect the abilities of the group, the aim always is to experience the joy of dancing with others and to create a sense of well-being and community. It is surprising how dancing with others in a circle can very quickly feel supportive and energising. Though not overt or intended, this can often lead to a feeling of something very moving, even spiritual.

As the name indicates, all dances are done in a circle. The majority are not partner dances, so everyone can join in and numbers don't matter. Because you are holding hands in a circle, you have support from the people either side of you, and this can be really important if you have difficulties with balance.

The music is amazingly varied. You can do a South African song of praise one minute, a joyful Israeli dance the next, a fast and furious Balkan one or a moving Romanian number after that. All the dances can be adapted to suit the mobility needs of the group, which makes it very inclusive. So I have taught in nursing homes and in a stroke group, where mobility was very limited and we did most of the dances seated. I have worked with many people who have dementia, and the simple

repetitive movements combined with wonderful music have a very beneficial effect on their health and well-being. I hadn't anticipated the triggering of reminiscences however. One gentleman, with severe dementia, came across from the other side of the room after one piece of music and asked if it was Russian (it was). He then proceeded to tell me about the life he had lived in Russia, and his Ph.D. Another Greek lady who talked gibberish (neither English nor Greek) and couldn't communicate started singing to a Greek tune, anticipating the next line!



Circle dance

I enjoy going to groups for the first time, particularly among older people. The mutterings as I walk in about "whose bright idea was this to do dancing? I have a dodgy knee/hip/back. I can't dance". And then the transformation as I put on the first very gentle piece, with walking steps only, as people start to say "Oh what lovely music, I can do this, it's very relaxing" is a great feeling! I go to a lot of WI and other social groups and do a one-off introductory session. As one lady says "you don't feel like it's exercise".

I am passionate about circle dancing and love teaching it because once people try it, the majority also enjoy its variety and gorgeous music. Details of regular groups are listed in the back of Mardles. Contact me if you are interested, or you are part of a WI or other group and would like a session!

We always give them a hearty round of applause at the end of the evening but do we dancers fully understand just how much of

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

Stepping into the Unknown? 11th February 2017

Well, it was a bit like that for me at least, never having put together a day of Workshops and Country Dance featuring Traditional Norfolk Tunes and Norfolk Step Dance before!

The idea came about through discussion within the Norfolk Folk Association (NFA) on up-beat ways of raising awareness of the rich resource of Norfolk Folk Music & Step Dance amongst those who might not be so familiar with it.

Enthused by the success of the "Introduction To Dance" event held at Hempton in October 2016, Chris Holderness, Alan Helsdon, Fiona Davies (all experienced and enthusiastic Norfolk Folk devotees) and I set about working up an idea for a suitable showcase event.

With a strong emphasis on fun, we settled on an afternoon of interactive workshops to be held at the well-located and well-appointed Wymondham Baptists' Church Hall. The workshops were to be led by Alan, Chris and Fiona, alternating between tune learning and step dance, and to be followed by an evening of dance featuring country folk dance band "Hushwing". The evening would also hold an opportunity for tune players to put their newly-learnt skills into practice by playing in with the band for some of the dances.

When it came to the day we had several folks signed up, but not as many as we had

hoped for, so we were concerned it might not be a success, in spite of undertaking a large amount of publicity including posters and flyers, email and Facebook networks, local news sites, schools, Scouts, Guides and other youth groups.

Our worries were unfounded; by play-off time we had over 20 keen folks assembled, and those involved with the tune learning settled down to tackle some up-tempo examples on a variety of instruments from ukulele, fiddle, concertina and guitar, to bodhran, recorder and clarinet. Tunes were introduced in a spirited way by Alan on accordion and Chris on fiddle, with their "students" having a choice of either melody or accompaniment lines. To quote Chris, "the players took to the tunes easily and with evident enjoyment!"

Fiona then led the step dance display and teaching, demonstrating contrasting coastal and inland styles with breathtaking energy, accompanied by Chris and Alan with others joining in from the assembled company.

And as if that wasn't enough, we were delighted to welcome renowned Suffolk Step Dancers Ella Beale and Doreen West, with their accompanist Lindsay Beale, along with Norfolk's Barry Mobbs and Monica Rackham who demonstrated what was certainly a new one on me, partnered step dance as a duo!



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
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All made a major contribution to the afternoon's activities, demonstrating their dynamic style of dance which also attracted enthusiastic participation. The next 3 hours, alternating between tune learning and dance, flew by with a real buzz.

This same spirit carried over into the evening when "Hushwing" (Cass and Dave Devlin, Richard Blake, David Reeves, Chris Holderness and Alan Helsdon) joined us for the Country Dance, playing, amongst others, all those tunes used during the afternoon and encouraging musicians from the afternoon to play in. Hushwing's consummate musical delivery and calling skills, along with their mellow, pacey sound, and their sense of fun, captured the mood perfectly.

The only disappointment regarding the evening was that we didn't have crowds queuing at the door for the dance, (note to self – always double check there are no other competing dances being run on the same evening, let alone two...), but we welcomed a handful of new folks who turned up to join in the dancing and, as Richard said, "what we lacked in numbers we made up for in enthusiasm and conviviality".

Summarising the day, Alan said "...a great deal got done in a very little time and the enjoyment was shared between 'leaders and followers' alike. The highlight for the new players must have been (in the evening) when

"Hushwing" stopped playing and, without warning, left the newcomers on their own for what probably seemed like a very long 32 bars. They coped perfectly!"

There was positive feedback from the learners too, typical of which was a note from one saying how much he and his partner had enjoyed the workshops and dancing. They had never danced before, but it was never too late, he said!

So, with a good deal of fun had and several of the objectives for the day well met, but with lessons most definitely learnt, we will review where we go from here in the hope of running something similar in the not too distant future; there is most definitely a distinct keepness to do so.

Meanwhile, a huge vote of thanks goes to all those who gave so freely of their time, experience and enthusiasm in connection with the running of the workshops and dance, and to all those who supported them equally as enthusiastically as participants.

A Suffolk pioneer in safeguarding East Anglia's unique folk music heritage has recently announced her retirement from conducting the business of one of the region's top musical charities.

Katie Howson set up the Stowmarket-based East Anglian Traditional Music Trust (EATMT) together with musician and archivist husband, John, after the couple spent years recording and playing alongside 'endangered' traditional East Anglian singers, dancers and musicians.

Since the Trust's foundation in 2000 and with Katie at the helm as General Manager, a wide range of community and education projects, a much-loved local calendar of events and activities at a national level have seen wider, younger and even international audiences honouring, enjoying and participating in East Anglia's traditional music offering, both within the region and beyond.

"We set out to keep the candle burning, but have really fanned the flames" explains the Trust's retiring General Manager and joint non-executive Director, Katie Howson, who admits to being amazed at how the Trust's range of activities has expanded over the years. 'It's been a dream in many ways and there's still so much to be done, but I feel it's time for me to move on. I'm looking forward to doing more of what I set out to do – playing more music and finding some new avenues to explore.'

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Looking Back More Simon Haines

Looking Back More: mid-Noughties to the Present

This is the last in the series, bringing myself up-to-date. However, just for a change, I'm going to list the highlights of this period without going into the usual detail, and instead I'll finish with a longish review of a brilliant concert we went to and participated in.

Let's start with The Hosepipe Band. We recorded our fifth album, "Kettleburgh Fete", in 2007. This consisted of 12 tracks of dancelength tunes, combining traditional and composed music. Details of the dances, written by some of our callers, were supplied in the CD notes.

The other major highlight of the period for the band is that for six years from 2010, we played for the New Year's Eve Ceilidh at Cecil Sharp House. This was a hugely enjoyable honour, even though it involved playing without a break from 8.00 pm. until 1.00 am with the wonderfully energetic Rob Sibthorpe (Sibby) calling.

In the end we decided that being out of the house for over twelve hours without let-up was too much at our age and we called it a day. We also played at Broadstairs Folk

Week, St Neots Festival a few times, in 2010 at Sidmouth Festival. They'd heard we were an "up-and-coming band" - even though we'd played there in 2001 and with other bands as far back as 1986. Hey Ho! I doubt we'll be asked again as we're now a downand-going band! We've also played a few times at Folk East which has always been great fun.

Our French band Bof! has continued to play regularly in this country and abroad. The main developments have been our inclusion in our line up of fabulous Breton singer Gwendal Moële, and the appearance of our fourth recording, just called "Bal" and a compilation, "The Best of Bof!" or "Le Meilleur de Bof!" comprising 17 tracks from our first three albums. We have performed twice at regular Colchester Folk Club evenings together with Trio Saozon, No Strings Attached and the duo Gwendal Moële and Paul Riley.

During this period, we formed a new quartet, Crownstreet, which consisted of Val Woollard, Stuart Moffat, Bobby Moffat and me. We played the usual round of folk clubs and made a CD, "Gardenaire". Sadly, this formation broke up, but Val and I recruited singer-guitarist Phil Lyons to become first Halfcrownstreet and then, more realistically

Rosewood. We are currently in the process of making our first CD.

The original dance band I set up with others in the early 1980s, Bass Instincts, had another short lease of life around 2008 and we made a recording we are still very proud of, "Back to Bassics", but there were too many complications and difficulties organising gigs for so many people, all of whom were in several different bands, so we gave up regular gigging and decided to ration ourselves. We were all prepared to play for the Colchester Folk Club Christmas Ceilidh in 2015 when disaster struck. Sadly our original drummer, Jon May, died in the September. The rest of us decided to do the gig anyway in memory of Jon and asked Christy Alston to drum for us. The gig went well with the band fees being donated to the Brain Tumour Charity. We repeated the exercise in December 2016, but decided after that that it really was the time to call it a day.



Bass Instincts

During the last three years, The Hosepipe Band has been involved in a new collaboration with North Essex poet Martin Newell. Band members have composed original music to accompany readings of three of Martin's long poems: *The Song of the Waterlily, Black Shuck*, and *The Green Children*. For this project, the band is Geoff Coombs, Simon Haines, Martin Newell, Val Woollard, Cara Bruns and Peter Nice (aka Nelson Surfquake). We have played a fascinating mix of gigs: arts centres,

literary festivals, poetry evenings, folk clubs and festivals – including Latitude in 2016. As this line-up we have produced two CDs: 'The Song of the Waterlily' & 'Black Shuck and The Green Children and Other Poems'. It's been huge fun playing to such a range of different audiences.

In 2010, Val Woollard, our children and I moved from Colchester to Hadleigh in Suffolk. When we discovered that the folk club that had thrived in the town up until the 1980s no longer existed, we decided to start a new club of our own. The first problem was finding a suitable venue. We couldn't afford the Quay Theatre in Sudbury and there didn't seem to be a suitable pub, but then we discovered we had the perfect venue two minutes from where we live: The Ansell Centre in Market Place, Hadleigh, a hall with good acoustics behind the United Reformed Church, more or less in the town centre. I remember our first evening. We invited lots of friends and we put on one of our own bands on to avoid losing too much money in case nobody came. When the evening came we opened the doors and waited. We hadn't advertised much beyond Hadleigh, so we were amazed when the first punters arrived. We didn't know any of them. That's nearly six years ago. In that time we've put on 63 main acts, 63 support acts and about 200 floor spots; incredibly, in that time we've only had three nights that could be considered less than successful. Most of our evenings attract 40-60 people. We'll be starting our seventh season in September 2017. One of our Spring club evenings for the last three years has

been part of a weekend devoted to French music and dance. The Friday evening concert features local performers as well as musicians from France; the Saturday includes music and dance workshops and an evening dance. We call our club Hadleigh Folk and Acoustic Music Nights, a name which allows us the widest possible choice of musical styles.

And that's about it. I started off this series writing about my own tastes in music and I talked enthusiastically about music and performers I enjoyed listening to and watching. Gradually over the years, I have played more and watched and listened less; this has its good and its not so good points.

Concert Review: Frankie Gavin and De Dannan

I'll end this last article with a review of what was for me a dream gig. Through my close involvement with the Irish band Frankie Gavin and De Dannan, I managed to arrange for Bof! to support the band when they played at The Marlow Theatre in Canterbury. For once, its not all about me.

Review: Frankie Gavin and De Dannan, The Marlowe Theatre, Canterbury, October 2016

Frankie Gavin and De Dannan was an inspired booking by the organisers of Canterbury Arts Festival. The band play all over the world these days – from Spain and Scandinavia to China and the USA as well as in their native Ireland, but sadly English audiences rarely get the opportunity to experience their unique brand of Irish music.

The sparklingly modern Marlowe Theatre, with its state of the art sound system, was a fitting venue for the band who opened their first half with the thrilling *Wild Irishmen*, a blistering set of jigs followed by a reel. Just when you thought the band was playing flat out, they changed gear again and astonished

the unsuspecting audience. They followed their opening instrumental onslaught with a jazzy, but no less stirring, treatment of the classic hornpipe Golden Eagle. De Dannan's mostly traditional tunes are led by virtuoso fiddle player Frankie Gavin, officially the world's fastest fiddle player, and master accordionist Barry Brady, who plays a eighty-year old Paolo Soprani instrument so as to re-create the sound of Irish-American musicians of the 1920s and 30s - a constant hallmark of the band's sound over the years. Gavin and Brady sometimes seem to be in deadly competition but the fact is they complement each other perfectly. Rock solid rhythm is provided by the understated but expert playing of guitarist Colm O'Caoimh and the insistent pounding and bowing of double-bassist Dan Bodwell.

Throughout the evening, sets of tunes alternated with songs from the charming Bernadine Casserly, who treated the audience to songs that were a perfect contrast, in fact almost an antidote, to the rip-roaring instrumentals which preceded and followed her presence on stage. She lights up the stage as she jokes with the band before treating the audience to an eclectic choice of songs. On some of these, Frankie Gavin puts down his fiddle and contributes gentle flute and whistle sounds. The songs range from Edith Piaf's romantic *If You Love*

Me, to the sad Irish favourite Gentle Mother, to Paul McCartney's Calico Skies - a song interwoven with snatches of the Beatles' Norwegian Wood. This was intended to be the band's last number, but perhaps predictably the Canterbury audience were not satisfied. They wanted more so they clapped and whistled until the band reappeared to give us what turned out to be two of the highlights of the evening: their audacious version of Handel's Arrival of the Queen of Sheba (in Galway!), in which the interplay between Gavin's fiddle and Brady's accordion was a wonder to hear. The evening ended with Bernadine's cheeky rendition of My Irish Molly Oh, a De Dannan signature song so familiar to some of their fans that they joined in the chorus.

Anyone who has followed De Dannan over the years will have seen some great line-ups; the current young line-up under the inspiring leadership of Frankie Gavin is undoubtedly among, if not the best. This was a great evening which won't be forgotten by the Marlowe Theatre audience.

Let's hope that English audiences do not have to wait too long for more opportunities to see this top Irish band at the height of their powers.

CD Reviews

Battlefield Band Producer's Choice Temple Records COMD 2108(Download DD 2108)



If you are a fan of Scottish music, this CD will come as a treat – and if you aren't, it might help change your mind...

"The Producer's Choice", is, as its name implies, a 'best of' collection of The Battlefield Band's music, assembled by Robin Morton, long-time producer of the band's recordings and sometimes viewed as 'the fifth member'. Having said that, the band has been in existence for going on for 50 years, so considerably more than four people have played in it over that time, and the nineteen musicians credited have some well-known names among their number.

The important question, though, is what's the music like? In short, excellent. As you'd expect, there are a number of tune sets with the pipes well to the fore, the rip-roaring *The Canongate Twitch* set being one of the best. However, there are some fine songs, too, both traditional and more recently written. Two that stand out are *The Last Trip Home*, a reflection on the passing of the day of the working horse, and the delightful, delicate *Rantin' Rovin' Robin*, beautifully sung by


Sylvia Barnes. Not all the music is Scottish in origin, a few Irish tune sets and songs having crept in as well, and it's not all crash-bangwallop, make-your-ears-bleed stuff by any means. A live version of *After Hours*, song and tunes together, makes for a rousing finish.

The CD is commendably produced with a minimum of packaging – though it's sufficient to list the essential 'who and what' – but much more extensive notes are available on the Temple Records website (www.templerecords.co.uk/notes/2108), from where you can also buy the album.

OK, perhaps there are a few too many tracks (the CD weighs in at nineteen), but this is a personal choice, after all. The collection was put together to celebrate the band's induction into the Scottish Traditional Music Hall of Fame, and that honour is well justified. It's a cracker – have a listen.

Loreley are a young folk duo from Reading who play a mixture of traditional folk lyrics and new music composed by themselves.

Since forming in 2014, Maddy Glenn (vocals, whistle, percussion) and Simon James

Chisholm (mandolin, guitar, concertina) have gone from strength to strength: releasing their highly-acclaimed debut EP, "Two Blind Mice", in early 2015 followed by a full-length album, "Fortified", in December.

In the short space of time that they have been together Loreley have managed to break out of their local music scene and are building a name for themselves all over the South East, cemented by a small tour of folk clubs and festivals in early 2016.


Their new album, "The Frozen North", is financed partly by various internet sites including Crowdfunder, Kicktraq and Kickstarter, and will be available on the Bandcamp website (where you can also find free samples of their music). The use of modern internet resources is in stark contrast to the material that Loreley create. All song lyrics are traditional, although Simon has penned quite a few of the tunes on the album.

The first track *Blow Northerne Wynd* sets the tone with a driving beat complementing the 14th century lyrics. We get the first glimpse of Maddy's enchanting voice that somehow manages to bring both beauty and menace to the music.

The album gets better as it progresses. Two tracks are worthy of being singled out. The first is called *High Barbaree*, the shanty popular with British and American sailors dating back to the Barbary Wars of the 18th Century. In my opinion, this is a much better version that the 1960's one recently released by Peter Bellamy on the "Ultimate Guide to English Folk". The second notable track is *Reynardine*. This is based on an 18th Century Grimm-like fairy tale of a werewolf-like bandit – great fun!

There is even an instrumental track, where we have an enchanting mix of a traditional Playford tune, *Upon a Summer's Day*, a modern tune *The Blind Angler* and an Irish jig *The Road to Lisdoonvarna*.

The album is enhanced with excellent sleeve notes that provide a comprehensive history of each of the tracks.

"This is us – this is what we do" was Loreley's stated objective for this album, and they have certainly proved that they can combine the beauty of traditional folk with the creativity and zest of youth. Keep an eye on these two – I think we will hear a lot more of them in the future.

Rattle on the Stovepipe Poor Ellen Smith WildGoose WGS419CD



Once again this trio of incomparable musicians comes up with a cracking good album of Old Timey songs and tunes. Dave Arthur seems to have cornered the market in songs of women dying for no good reason at all. On the last album it was a woman dying in child-birth because the family had no money to pay for the doctor's ministrations – echoes of the state of health care in the USA today, one surmises – but this time the heroine of the title track lies dead of gunshot wounds. This could be a surreptitious allusion to current US crime statistics. If that is the case, this is a very


topical CD. Needless to say, the song and its accompaniment of Pete Cooper on fiddle, Dan on guitar and Dave on banjo is one to come back to again and again.

The rest of the album is full of listenable songs and tunes, some of which are very reminiscent of their English forebears and are fascinating to compare to versions we all know and sing. Others are recent compositions which will stand the test of time I am sure. The sleeve notes are exceptionally good, giving full details of the original singers, collectors and recordings that interested folks can go to and compare with the current offerings.

My verdict – as a fan of this wonderfully inventive and talented trio – is that you cannot do without this CD. Go out and buy it now!

Mick Ryan & Paul Downes The Passing Hour WildGoose WGS417CD



It was a pleasure to review this album that oozes class. Both Mick Ryan and Paul Downes have been around for a few years, although they have only got together in the later stages of their respective careers. Their pedigree shows. Their voices exude a blend of

richness and fullness that makes even difficult passages sound easy.

Mick Ryan is well known on the folk scene as a fine singer and writer. Having written both comic and serious material for the very popular band Crows in the 1980s, he has since written for radio and a series of highly successful folk musicals, most recently "The Navvy's Wife."

Paul Downes has a rich musical background that has progressed through working with Phil Beer, The Arizona Smoke Revue, Pete Seeger and The Joyce Gang. Nine albums with bands, four highly acclaimed solo albums and over two hundred session credits have still left time for Paul to tour every concert venue, theatre and festival in Britain, plus many tours in the USA and Europe.

Now the songs on this new album – a carefully combined mixture of sad songs, happy songs, protest songs, sea songs, work songs and funny songs – something for everyone. Some of them are marked as "traditional" and arranged by one or both, whilst many selfpenned (mainly by Mick Ryan). In addition, there are others they have borrowed from other singers as they have toured the country performing their wares.

A couple of favourites spring to mind on listening to this album – the bouncing merriment of *Bartholamew [sic] Fair* is infectious. It evokes images of the hustle and bustle of a medieval town fair. *Thankful Village* on the other hand is a song written by Mick Ryan about a village where all the boys and men came back alive from The Great War, but not all were totally like they were when they left. This is the fourth Ryan and Downes duo album and they have a busy touring schedule through the year if you want to go and see them. Have a look on YouTube to get a flavour of this talented duo.



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
